UCC is aware that adult and nontraditional students must meet various responsibilities at home and at work while making extra efforts to reach their academic goals. We also know the value of successfully completing a college degree, not just in financial terms, but also in terms of personal development and social change.

Our ongoing goal is to reach adult and nontraditional students because we know that you face significant non-academic responsibilities that make your college years very different from the traditional college experience. Our first task is to reach you to make sure that you are informed of important developments, events, resources, services, dates, and major and minor programs that are available to students during the evening, weekends, and online. UCC will also help guide you to vital web information to enhance your experience at Rutgers University in a more effective and efficient manner. In addition, we advocate for you inside the larger Rutgers University community by recommending policies and programs to meet your specific needs.

This past Fall, we participated in adult recruitment, orientations, transition programs, and Veteran outreach initiatives, to name a few. Our most important and impressive accomplishments was our contribution to the formation of two new adult-friendly degree granting units: the [School of Management and Labor Relations](#), which has begun fully accepting students directly into the school for a [Bachelor of Science \(BS\) degree in Labor & Employment Relations](#) and the [Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy](#) which will begin accepting students in the Fall 2011 term for a [BS degree in Public Health](#). Through our continued research, collaborations, and focus groups, we remain committed to developing programs to attract a growing number of nontraditional students to Rutgers. In fact, through our enhanced outreach via our Virtual Learning Community on [sakai](#), [myRutgers](#), UCC list serves and direct mail, we are confident that we will identify more nontraditional students. We have also started a volunteer mentoring program so that Rutgers faculty and staff who are veterans can act as resources for an anticipated influx of returning veterans in the years to come. These are just a few of our many accomplishments and actions.

Our goal is to create a sense of community for those students who do not live on campus and whose lives are also dedicated to responsibilities outside of academia.

RU An Employed Student?

The economic situation in the U.S. is impacting the unemployment rate by the thousands, and some Americans don't expect to be recalled to work anytime soon. Rutgers [Student Employment Office](#) in New Brunswick, under the umbrella of the Financial Aid Office, continues to administer employment programs during these times of economic stress by collaborating with UCC and other departments to convey the numerous opportunities available to adult and nontraditional students while they attend college.

The following employment programs serve our students: the **Job Location and Development Program (JLDP)**, which consists of unskilled to technical, non-work study jobs offered on a part-time and seasonal basis for all university students, and the **Federal Work-Study Program (FWSP)**, which is funded by the federal government and the university for students eligible for financial aid. These programs can provide contacts that will help shape your future career goals. Both programs offer flexible, part-time employment opportunities on and off campus. Employment exists in various departments and labs within the University and local non-profit agencies.

Douglass Bunting Women at Rutgers

The [Mary I. Bunting Program](#) was established in 1958 by Mary I. Bunting, the Dean of Douglass College at that time. This program, which is now a part of Douglass Residential College, provides individualized advising and support services for mature women students. Women enrolled full-time or part-time in any of the undergraduate schools at Rutgers-New Brunswick are eligible to affiliate with UCC and the Douglass Residential College Bunting Program; these schools include the School of Arts and Sciences, School of Environmental and Biological Sciences, School of Management and Labor Relations, School of Engineering, Mason Gross School of the Arts, School of Pharmacy, and the College of Nursing. Any woman who has been out of high school for five years or more automatically becomes a Bunting student when she joins Douglass Residential College. UCC STUDENT HIGHLIGHT



Life for William Scott McLane has never been easy, but even through his life’s mild peaks and severe valleys he decided to return to Rutgers part time in Fall 2008 through the [SAS Academic Amnesty](#) program. Scott, as he prefers to be called, describes the first attempt at Rutgers in the late 80’s and early 90’s as not so well. He recalls after an alcohol related incident at the Busch Campus dorm that he was referred to the Rutgers [Alcohol and Other Drug assistance Program \(ADAP\)](#), but at that time he wasn’t ready to get help.

A short time later he recounts that his girlfriend left him, his drinking went on and he awoke fifteen years later. He had become homeless, was living out of a car and at 39, had failing health. He never married, had no children, no career or bank account. He admits he was totally destitute and in the depths of despair. He realized his loneliness most because he was estranged from his family and friends. Scott mentions, “My dad, with a very high IQ, had graduated from St. Peters in Jersey City, secured a job with what is now one of the largest accounting firms in the world, however he died alone in a dark and dingy room over a bar. Alcoholism is not an intellectual exercise and even a high IQ could not deter him from it.”

Sadly prior to his father’s death he recounts, “My only recollection of him was in handcuffs leaving our home with police officers. It would be impossible to quantify the damage that alcoholism has done to my family, but thankfully, I seem to have been given another chance and my head is clear.”

Scott, a few days short of his 46th birthday, is currently an American Studies major with a GPA of 3.4. He proudly noted that although it took 18 years to return, he has six classes until graduation and is thinking about graduate school. A few short months prior to his return to Rutgers he was reunited with his mother before her passing. Scott thanked whatever divine force that allowed his mother to witness his road to recovery. He is celebrating over five years of sobriety and is giving back by speaking at prisons, drug rehabilitation centers and to convicted drunk drivers, besides studying to keep a strong GPA.

He spoke to graduate students at the [Rutgers Center for Alcohol Studies](#) and most recently to the senior class at their annual retreat as well as the SADD group at his old high school-Christian Brothers Academy in Monmouth county. He recounts he later found out that his senior year at CBA was financed by Christian Brothers due to his father’s loss of employ. Scott noted, “It’s been a slow, painful, and humbling journey. It’s such a gift to be able to give back.”
